Position Purpose

The objective of this position is to provide a Renal Transplant Surgery Fellow role to:

- Undertake training in all components of Renal transplant surgery
- Undertake specific training in organ retrieval to reach independent operating
- Support the renal retrieval roster (in and out of hours) once independence reached
- Support the deceased donor transplant surgery roster once independence reached
- Undertake specific training in transplant sub-specialties (eg. Renal access surgery)
- Undertake specific training in Paediatric Renal Transplant
- Undertake specific training in live donor transplant surgery (nephrectomies)
- Engage in research activities
- Provide Leave cover for Unit consultants either for outpatients or theatre.
- Provide support and teaching to resident and Registrar medical staff through direction and management of patients.
- Support emergency work to be done in hours.

Please see draft duty schedule (appendix 1) for further details of this position. To ensure sufficient training opportunities, attendance at daytime work will be secondary to attendance at renal retrieval and implantation surgery, with the exception of surgical lists.

In the first instance, attendance at retrieval and transplant surgery will be in the capacity as trainee, with full consultant support. Once independence is reached, attendance will be in capacity as lead surgeon.

About Renal Transplant Unit

Austin Health Renal Transplant Surgery Program

Renal Transplantation commenced at Austin Health in 1974, and we have performed over 1000 transplants in the following 44 years. In recent times, demands for transplantation surgery, renal access surgery and other general surgery on renal patients have increased. We currently perform approximately 75 renal transplants per year, including 20 live donor transplants.

Austin Health is the provider of transplantation surgery to several other services as part of the Victorian Kidney Transplant Collaborative (VKTC). Commencing in 2010, the VKTC offers live and deceased transplantation surgery to non-transplanting Renal Hub Services, including Eastern Health, Barwon Health, Bendigo Health and St Vincent's (live surgery only). Since 2013, Austin Health has provided adult donor nephrectomy surgery for Paediatric transplantation at Royal Children's Hospital.

The Renal Transplant Program at Austin Health is highly collaborative with surgical input and expertise drawn from general surgery, vascular surgery and urology units. Paediatric transplants are performed at the Royal Children's Hospital, with a

memorandum of understanding in place between Austin Health and the Royal Children's Hospital. This involves a live donor clinic and live donor surgery at Austin and deceased donor and live donor transplants at the Royal Children's Hospital. Fifty Paediatric transplants have been performed in the last 5 years.

The unit has had a keen involvement with the Australian Kidney Exchange since its origins in 2010. Patients with incompatible donors are registered with the paired kidney exchange program and the service has participated in numerous live donor chains. As the statewide liver transplant service provider, Austin Health also plays a lead role in the retrieval of all abdominal organs, including renal-only organ retrieval in deceased donors (following brain death and cardiac death).

Austin Health Renal Surgery

The renal surgery unit provides general surgery services for the renal unit, including peritoneal dialysis access, hernia repair and other general surgical procedures. Snapshot of the Victorian Kidney Transplant Collaborative.

The VKTC provides a framework for transplant services across the group of 5 health services – Austin, St Vincent's, Eastern, Bendigo and Barwon. In addition to this are the Paediatric transplants at the Royal Children's run under a Memorandum of Understanding with the RCH. The framework is one of shared protocols and referral pathways, with an emphasis on communication between the groups at each health service. The group holds monthly meetings to discuss clinical challenges.

Purpose and Accountabilities

Clinical Care

- Provide comprehensive renal transplant surgical management of inpatients and outpatients and associated surgical procedures.
- Participate in Unit meetings and activities.
- Support a retrieval service as required.
- Provide a consultative service to other Units as required.
- Provide leadership and guidance to Registrars.
- Demonstrate a commitment to working as a team member with peer medical, resident, nursing and other staff to provide efficient, safe and quality care across the continuum.
- Participate in the unit audit and review of clinical practices to improve clinical outcomes.
- Attend Division of Surgery audit (mandatory) and Surgical Grand Rounds (expected).
- Provide an on-call service as required

Teaching and training

- Participate in both Under Graduate and Post Graduate teaching plus nursing teaching if required.
- Participate in patient education Sessions if required.
- Develop clinical skills in medical and surgical management of the complete range of renal transplant and associated conditions and to develop research and teaching skills in these fields.

Research

- Participate in clinical and/or basic research.
- Demonstrate and provide leadership in research.
- It is expected that the fellow will be a member of, or join, the TSANZ and prepare research to present at the annual congress.

Other

- Assist the Head of Unit in administrative duties as required.
- Assist in making a safe working environment by reporting any incidents of unsafe work practices, sites or equipment. Assist in the resolution of these issues.
